## Every child is unique...

Federal and state laws guarantee all students with disabilities the right to special education and related services designed to address their unique needs. Services and supports must be individualized for each student and cannot be refused for reasons of cost or local availability.

### Special education can include:

- individualized instruction
- smaller classes & low student/teacher ratios
- specialized teaching strategies and instructional materials
- extended school year instruction
- full day instruction for pre-schoolers
- transition services to prepare teens with disabilities for work and adult life

#### **Related services include:**

- physical and occupational therapy
- speech therapy
- psychological and social work services
- testing for and fitting hearing aids
- vocational services
- transportation to and from school
- assistive technology and specialized equipment.

# The Individualized Education Program:

# The Cornerstone of Your Child's Special Education

After your child has been evaluated, a team of professionals from your school district - the Child Study Team (CST) - will meet with you to develop an Individual Education Program (IEP). Parents are a full and equal partner in this process. The IEP will describe the special education and related services your child will receive.

### This plan will describe in detail:

- individualized goals and objectives
- transition services, if your child is over 14
- related services your child needs and the frequency and duration of those services
- the length of the school day and academic year
- the kind of learning environment your child needs
- where your child will attend school this is known as *PLACEMENT*. Placement is deter-



mined after the goals and objectives are developed and after you and your CST have agreed on the nature and scope of the services and supports your child needs.

### **A Full Range of Options**

Your child has the right to be educated in the setting that is appropriate to his or her needs as described in the IEP. The law says that students with disabilities must be educated in the Least Restrictive Environment (LRE). This means that you and your school district must begin the discussion of your child's placement by first considering the supports and services that would allow your child to be educated in a regular classroom. But just because a placement is in a regular classroom, or is close to home, does not make it an appropriate choice - nor does it make it the least restrictive setting. The placement selected for your child must meet all of your child's needs. If this cannot be done in a regular classroom with supports, other options must be considered. These include:

- a program in which your child spends all or part of the day in regular classes, with or without supports, and the remainder of the day in a resource center:
- a special class for students with disabilities in your local school district;
- a special class in another school district, or a regional or county-based special service or vocational school;
- an approved private school that specializes in educating children with disabilities;
- a hospital or other medical setting, or homebased instruction;
- a non-sectarian, non-public school that is not specifically approved for students with disabilities; and,
- a residential school.

### **Parents Have Rights Too**

As the parent of a child with disabilities, you have the right to:

- be kept informed of action taken or planned by the school district affecting the education of your child;
- access school records concerning your child, and request that irrelevant records be destroyed;
- be notified in writing of any meeting concerning your child;
- participate as an equal partner in meetings concerning the evaluation, IEP, and placement of your child;
- visit proposed placements, observe classrooms and ask questions;
- disagree with recommendations of the school district, including their recommended placement or the related services;
- request an independent evaluation of your child by professionals who are not employees of the school district;
- request due process or mediation to resolve disputes and disagreements. Your school district is required to give you a copy of the PRISE document (Parents' Rights In Special Education) which explains your rights in easy to understand language.
